

• WHAT IS OLLI AT BCC? The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Berkshire Community College (OLLI at BCC) is a membership-led organization committed to the idea that learning is a lifelong, multifaceted experience. It offers courses, lectures, trips and special events year round. Courses are given in Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer semesters.

The creative voice is within each of us. This workshop will assist participants to open doors, listen to their inner voices and write from that place. Simple writing exercises, introduced through poetry, will encourage an awareness of hidden thoughts, feelings and memories. In a nonjudgmental, supportive environment, students will be free to share their writings with the group and hear their own voices speak. REGISTRATION IS LIMITED TO 12.

The short story as a distinct literary form arose in the 19th century. We will study this genre by reading Poe's "The Cask of Amontillado"; Hawthorne's "Young Goodman Brown"; Gogol's "The Overcoat"; de Maupassant's "The Diamond Necklace"; Chekhov's "The Lady with the Dog" and James' "The Real Thing." Points for discussion will be based on critical analysis by Michael Krasny, Professor of English at San Francisco State University, and by participants. Shorter selections will be read in class while longer ones will be distributed for reading at home.
