WHAT IS OLLI AT BCC?

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Berkshire Community College (OLLI at BCC) is a membership-led organization committed to the idea that learning is a lifelong, multifaceted experience. OLLI offers courses, lectures, trips and special events year round. Courses are given in Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer semesters. OLLI encourages members to be active on committees.

WHAT ARE THE MEMBERSHIP OPTIONS?

The *tax-deductible* **Annual Membership** fee is \$50.00 per person and entitles members to attend classes in all four semesters and to participate in the Distinguished Speaker Series and in Special Events all year.

The *tax-deductible* **Summer Membership** fee is \$25.00 per person and entitles members to attend classes in the Summer Semester and to participate in the Distinguished Speaker Series and in Special Events programs during June, July and August.

WHAT ARE THE COSTS FOR COURSES AND OTHER EVENTS?

Course fees per semester are: \$40 for one course, \$80 for 2 to 3 courses and \$100 for unlimited courses. Distinguished Speaker lectures are \$10 per lecture for members. The cost for Special Events varies according to the event. Scholarships are available.

WHAT IS A FLEX PASS?

For those members who take extended trips or live away from the Berkshires part of the year, OLLI offers a convenient *FLEX PASS*. Pay \$40 to access up to 4 class sessions in the Summer semester or 6 classes in the Fall, Winter and Spring semesters from the course offerings. Restrictions are noted on the course registration page.

Whether plucked, bowed or struck, stringed instruments produce sounds that have enriched world cultures from time immemorial. Four Berkshire musicians will give insights into the history, sound production, repertoire and idiosyncrasies of their stringed instruments illustrated with both live and recorded performances.

JUNE 1 • The Queen and I; There is Really no Second Fiddle! A brief history of the violin; the repertoire; the viola and its development; why it is a necessary voice in the orchestra and in chamber music.

JUNE 8 • **There is Always Room for the Cello** An overview of the cello: how it's made, the bow, important cello repertoire, historically important cellists, aspects of performance and cello technique.

Practice everyday phrases and questions for use in restaurants, markets and cultural institutions; experience an easy way to properly pronounce the most useful Italian phrases and gain a better understanding of Italian opera. THE ARTIST'S STUDIO

Thursdays 10:00 – 11:30 Various Locations June 4, 11, 18, 25 From the sumptuously furnished studios of the late 19th century to the basic workrooms of the present day, studio spaces have played a dynamic role in the history of American art, reflecting and shaping the aesthetic vision. This course offers an intimate behind-the-scenes look into the unique work spaces of three American artists: Daniel Chester French (1850-1931), Norman Rockwell (1894-1978) and Kim Saul (1959-present). An introductory lecture at the Norman

Rockwell Museum sets the stage for visits to each of the artist's studios. Directions to studios provided with confirmation.

Stephanie Plunkett, Deputy Director and Chief Curator at the Norman Rockwell Museum, has organized many exhibitions about the art of illustration including *LitGraphic: The World of the Graphic Novel*.

JUNE 11 • Daniel Chester French: A Portrait of the Artist in His Studio at Chesterwood

Donna Hassler, Director of Chesterwood and noted authority on American sculpture, will bring participants "back in time" during their visit to learn more about the man, the sculptor and his ingenious working methods.

JUNE 18 • The Artist at Work: Norman Rockwell and His Studios

Corry Kanzenberg, Curator of Archival Collections at the Norman Rockwell Museum, is the manager of the Museum's Library and the Norman Rockwell Archives.

JUNE 25 • Studio Visit with Artist Kim Saul

Kim Saul, a staff and freelance designer and illustrator for local papers, businesses, agencies and organizations since 1984, has turned her focus towards painting resulting in a show of her works at the Everhart Museum in Scranton, PA.

IUNE 19 Volcanism; igneous and metamorphic rocks; earthquakes and seismology

JUNE 26 • Interior of the Earth; geomagnetism; heat flow

JULY 3 • All-day Field Trip to visit various geologic sites in Berkshire County and the Connecticut River Valley
